# Voter Challenges

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

There shall not be a limit on the number of persons whose qualifications such elector may challenge.

#### Revision to Code Section 21-2-229

(Qualifications to Register to Vote)

- The registrars must set a hearing on the challenge within <u>10</u> business days after serving notice of the challenge.
- Notice of the date, time, and place of the hearing and a copy of the challenge must be served to the voter being challenged within <u>10</u> business days following the filing of the challenge.
- Notice of the hearing must be served to the elector making the challenge as well.

Revision to Code Section 21-2-230

(Electors Right to Vote in an Election)

 Challenge may be made at any time prior to the elector voting at their polling place or, if such elector cast an absentee ballot, prior to 5:00 P.M. on the day before absentee ballots are to begin to be scanned and tabulated.

Failure to comply with the provisions of this Code section by the board of registrars shall subject such board to sanctions by the State Election Board.



Changes in verification of absentee ballot applications

O.C.G.A. 21-2-381 21-2-219

- One of the biggest changes to Georgia voting laws 2021 has to do with mail-in absentee voting. An estimated 1.3 million voters used that method in the November 2020 polls.
- In the new law, individuals aged 65 and over, in the military, living overseas, or those with a disability will still be able to apply for a ballot once during the election cycle.
- However, the earliest they can send in their mail-in request is 11 weeks before the election date, <u>as</u> <u>opposed to six months prior</u>, as was previously the case. This cuts the request window by more than half.
- Additionally, the deadline by which an application needs to be completed and returned has been moved up as well. Voters are now required to return the completed application two Fridays before the election date instead of the Friday before Election Day, as was previously the case.

Exception can be made only for a hospitalized voter.

# SB 202 – SECTION 25 (Deadlines for the November 2, 2021, Special Election)

Amends the window for the start of accepting absentee ballots to 78 days prior to the election
☐ Important that the exact acceptance date is available in case someone asks

Places a deadline for receiving absentee ballot applications at least 11 days prior to the election

Creates a new standard absentee ballot application (Make sure all workers understand how to complete the absentee ballot application and have a current list of other acceptable IDs.
□ Georgia Driver's License Number
□ State ID Number

Prohibits governments from mailing absentee ballot applications to voter's who have not requested them

# THE APPEARANCE OF THE ABSENTEE BALLOT AND ENVELOPE

The newly enacted voting laws in the state also affect the way the absentee ballots and envelopes look.

According to the Georgia Election Integrity Act of 2021, each absentee ballot will be printed on a special security paper. The voter's precinct and ID will appear at the top of the ballot.

Once the voter fills in the circles to vote for their chosen candidate, they're required to place the ballot in the envelope it came with, which will have their name, signature, and driver's license number, state ID number, or the last four digits of their Social Security Number.

To protect the voter's privacy, all sensitive information will be hidden once they seal the envelope.

The State of Georgia allows absentee voting by mail and in-person. No excuse is required to vote before election day.

#### ABSENTEE VOTING BY MAIL

Georgia law allows for absentee by mail ballots to be requested no earlier than 78 days and no later than 11 days prior to an election. To request an absentee ballot, voters should complete an absentee ballot application and return the absentee ballot application to their county registration office.

Absentee ballot applications can be returned by mail, fax, email (as an attachment), or in-person to the local County Board of Registrar's Office.



#### ABSENTEE VOTING IN-PERSON

# Any application for an absentee ballot sent to any elector by any person or entity must utilize the form of the application made available by the Secretary of State and must clearly and prominently disclose on the face of the form the following information:

- ➤ This is **NOT** an official government publication; and
- was **NOT** provided to you by any government entity; and this is **NOT a ballot**.
- ➤ It is being distributed by {"name and address of the person, organization, or other entity distributing such document or material}

## The disclaimer required shall be:

- 1. A sufficient font size to be clearly readable by the recipient of the communication; and
- 2. Contained in a printed box set apart from the other contents of the communication; and
- 3. Printed with a reasonable degree of color contrast between the background and the printed disclaimer.

# Absentee Ballot Requests

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

## **Revision to Code Section 21-2-381**

- Voters can submit an absentee ballot application no earlier than 78 days or less than 11 days prior to the date of the primary or election, or runoff.
- To be timely received, an application for an absentee-by-mail ballot must be received by the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk no later than 11 days prior to the primary, election, or runoff.



# Absentee Ballot Applications

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

- Any person applying for an absentee-by-mail ballot shall make application in writing on the form made available by the Secretary of State.
- In order to confirm the identity of the voter, such form shall require the elector to provide:
  - his or her name
  - · date of birth
  - · address as registered
  - · address where the elector wishes the ballot to be mailed, and
  - the number of his or her Georgia driver's license or identification card issued pursuant to Article 5 of Chapter 5 of Title 40.
    - If such elector does not have a Georgia driver's license or identification card, the elector must provide a copy of a form of identification listed in subsection (c) of Code Section 21-2-417.



# Absentee Ballot Applications

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

## The application shall also include:

- the identity of the primary, election, or runoff in which the elector wishes to vote;
- and the name and relationship of the person requesting the ballot if other than the elector;
- and an oath for the elector or relative to write his or her usual signature with a **pen and ink** affirming that the elector is a qualified Georgia elector and the facts presented on the application are true.
- Secretary of State, election superintendent, board of registrars, other governmental entity, nor employee or agent thereof shall send absentee ballot applications directly to any elector except upon request of such elector or a relative authorized to request an absentee ballot for such elector. Only to individuals who have not already requested, received, or voted an absentee ballot in the primary, election, or runoff.



## How to return your absentee ballot application

No person or entity other than the elector, a relative authorized to request an absentee ballot for such elector, a person signing as assisting an illiterate or physically disabled elector with his or her application, a common carrier charged with returning the ballot application, an absentee ballot clerk, a registrar, or a law enforcement officer in the course of an investigation shall handle or return an elector's completed absentee ballot application. Handling a completed absentee ballot application by any person or entity other than as allowed in this paragraph is a misdemeanor.

# Returning an Absentee Ballot

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

In order to verify that the absentee ballot was voted by the elector who requested the ballot, the elector shall print the number of his or her Georgia driver's license number or identification card in the space provided on the outer oath envelope.

The elector shall also print his or her date of birth in the space provided in the outer oath envelope.

If the elector does not have a Georgia driver's license or state identification card, the elector must print the last four digits of his or her social security number in the space provided on the outer oath envelope.

If the elector does not have a Georgia driver's license, identification card, or a social security number, the elector must place a copy of one of the forms of identification set forth in subsection (c) of Code Section 21-2-417 in the outer envelope.



# Verifying Absentee Ballot Application Information

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

- If found ineligible or if the application is not timely received, the clerk or the board of registrars shall deny the application and promptly notify the applicant in writing of the ground of ineligibility.
  - However, an absentee ballot application shall not be rejected solely due to a mismatch between
    the identifying information of the elector on the application and the identifying information of
    the elector on file with the board of registrars.
  - In such cases, the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk shall send the elector a
    provisional absentee ballot with the designation 'Provisional Ballot' on the outer oath envelope
    and information prepared by the Secretary of State as to the process to be followed to cure the
    discrepancy.
- If the registrar or clerk is unable to determine the identity of the elector from information given on the application or if the application is not complete or if the oath on the application is not signed, the registrar or clerk should promptly contact the elector in writing to request the necessary additional information and a signed copy of the oath.

# Mailing Absentee Ballots

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

- For all timely received applications for absentee ballots, the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk shall mail or issue absentee ballots, provisional absentee ballots, and notices of rejection as soon as possible upon determining their eligibility within the time periods set forth in this subsection.
- During the period for advance voting, the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk shall make such determinations and mail or issue absentee ballots, provisional absentee ballots, and notices of rejection of application within three days after receiving a timely application for an absentee ballot.
- an elector confined in a hospital may make application for an absentee ballot on the day of a primary or election or during a ten-day period immediately preceding the day of such primary or election.
- Such application shall immediately be processed and the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk may deliver the absentee ballot to such elector.





## UNSOLICITED ABSENTEE BALLOT APPLICATIONS AND NEW THIRD-PARTY RULES

According to the new law provisions, local and state governments are now prohibited from sending unsolicited applications.

Any person applying for an absentee-by-mail ballot shall make application "in writing" on the form made available by the Secretary of State.

Additionally, third-party entities that send out applications must ensure they're clearly marked in a legible font, stating that the applications are not official government publications and that they are not ballots. The Act also requires them to clearly state the name of the entity sending the blank request.


The third-party group rules also prohibit them from sending applications to voters who have already requested or cast an absentee ballot. The law imposes stiff penalties for each duplicate they send out.



A blank application for absentee ballot shall be made available online by the SOS, election superintendent, and registrar, but "neither" the SOS, election superintendent, board of registrars, other governmental entity, nor employee shall send absentee ballot applications directly to any elector "except upon request."

An authorized relative may make a request on behalf of the elector.

Submitting false information on an application for an absentee ballot shall be a violation of Code Sections: O.C.G.A. 21-2-560 and 21-2-571



Assisting an illiterate or physically disabled elector





No person or entity other than a relative authorized to request an absentee ballot for an elector or a person signing as assisting an illiterate or physically disabled elector can send an elector an absentee ballot application "that is prefilled with the elector's required information."



No person or entity other than the elector, a relative authorized to request an absentee ballot for an elector, a person signing as assisting an illiterate or physically disabled elector with an application, a common carrier (mail person) charged with returning the ballot application, an absentee ballot clerk, a registrar, or a law enforcement officer in the course of an investigation shall handle or return an elector's completed absentee ballot application.

Unauthorized handling of a completed absentee ballot application
Handling a completed absentee ballot application by any person or entity other than as allowed is a "misdemeanor."

# Verifying Absentee Ballots

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

The registrar or clerk will then compare the number of the elector's Georgia driver's license number or state identification card and date of birth entered on the absentee ballot envelope contained in the elector's voter registration records.

If the elector has affirmed on the envelope that he or she does not have a Georgia driver's license or state identification card, the registrar or clerk shall compare the last four digits of the elector's social security number and date of birth entered on the envelope with the same information contained in the elector's voter registration records.

The registrar or clerk shall also confirm that the elector signed the oath and the person assisting the elector, if any, signed the required oath.

If the elector has signed the elector's oath, the person assisting has signed the required oath, if applicable, and the identifying information entered on the absentee ballot envelope matches the same information contained in the elector's voter registration record, the registrar or clerk shall so certify by signing or initialing his or her name below the voter's oath.



# Verifying Absentee Ballots

Senate Bill 202 - Effective July 1st

If the elector has failed to sign the oath, or if the signature identifying information entered on the absentee ballot envelope does not appear to be valid match the same information appearing in the elector's voter registration record, or if the elector has failed to furnish required information or information so furnished does not conform with that on file in the registrar's or clerk's office, or if the elector is otherwise found disqualified to vote, the registrar or clerk shall write across the face of the envelope 'Rejected,' giving the reason therefor.

The elector may cure a failure to sign the oath, an invalid signature nonmatching identifying information, or missing information by submitting an affidavit to the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk along with a copy of one of the forms of identification enumerated in subsection (c) of Code Section 21-2-417.

## **Drop Box Requirements**

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

#### Revisions and new subsections to Code Section 21-2-382

A board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk must establish at least <u>one</u> drop box as a means for absentee by mail electors to deliver their ballots to the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk.

A board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk may establish additional drop boxes only if the additional drop boxes totaling the lesser of either:

- One drop box for every 100,000 active registered voters in the county;
- Or the number of advance voting locations in the county.
- Any additional drop boxes must be evenly geographically distributed by population in the county.

Drop boxes may be established at the office of the board of registrars or inside locations at which advance voting is conducted. During an emergency declared by the Governor, drop boxes may be located outside the office of the board of registrars or outside of locations at which advance voting is taking place.



# **Drop Box Requirements**

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

## Revisions and new subsections to Code Section 21-2-382

- The drop box may be open during the hours of advance voting at the location and closed when advance voting is not being conducted at that location. All drop boxes shall be closed when the advance voting period ends.
- The drop box location must have adequate lighting and be under constant surveillance by an election official or his or her designee, law enforcement official, or licensed security guard.
- The opening slot of a drop box can not allow ballots to be tampered with or removed.
- It must be designed to minimize the ability for liquid or other substances that may damage ballots to be poured into the drop box.
- Must be labeled "OFFICIAL ABSENTEE BALLOT DROP BOX" and clearly display the signage developed by SOS.



# **Drop Box Requirements**

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

## Revisions and new subsections to Code Section 21-2-382

- The board of registrars or absentee ballot must arrange for the collecting and return of ballots deposited at each drop box at the conclusion of <u>each day</u> where advance voting takes place.
- Collection of ballots from a drop box must be made by a team of at least <u>two</u> people. Any person collecting ballots from a drop box shall have sworn an oath in the same form as the oath for poll officers set forth in Code Section 21-2-95.
- The collection team must complete and sign a ballot transfer form upon removing the ballots from the drop box. Then immediately transfer the ballots to the board of registrars or absentee ballot clerk, who shall process and store the ballots in the same manner as absentee ballots returned by mail are processed and stored.



## Poll Watchers

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now


#### Revisions to Code Section 21-2-408

The location of the tabulation center must ensure that each poll watcher can fairly observe the procedures.

No person is eligible to serve as a poll watcher unless he or she has completed training provided by the political party, political body, or candidate designating the poll watcher. SOS will provide the training to those groups.

Each political party, political body, or candidate must certify under oath that the named poll watchers have completed the required training.

The Secretary of State is to provide training material



# Advance Voting Dates & Notice

- There shall be a period of advance voting that shall commence:
  - · on the fourth Monday immediately prior to each primary or election; and
  - as soon as possible prior to a runoff from any other general primary or election but no later than the second Monday immediately prior to such runoff and shall end on the Friday immediately prior to each primary, election, or runoff.
- Voting shall be conducted:
  - Beginning at 9:00 A.M. and ending at 5:00 P.M. on weekdays, other than observed state holidays.
  - Second and third Saturdays during the hours of 9:00 A.M. through 5:00 P.M.
- If the registrar or absentee ballot clerk so chooses, the second Sunday, the third Sunday, or both the second and third Sundays prior to a primary or election during hours determined by the registrar or absentee ballot clerk, but no longer than 7:00 A.M. through 7:00 P.M.



# Advance Voting Dates & Notice

- The Board of registrars must publish and post the dates, times, and locations of the availability of advance voting:
  - on the homepage of the county's publicly accessible website associated with elections or registrations, if applicable, or in a newspaper of general circulation
  - and at a prominent location in the county
- The notice must be published/posted:
  - no later than 14 days prior to the beginning of the advance voting period for a general primary, special primary, general election, or special election and
  - no later than seven days prior to the beginning of the advance voting period for any run-off election.
- Any new advance voting locations added after that deadline shall be published in the same manner as soon as possible.
- The board of registrars shall not remove any advance voting location after the notice
  of such location is published, except in the case of an emergency or unavoidable event
  that renders a location unavailable for use.



# Early Processing/Scanning

- Can begin at 8:00 A.M. on the third Monday prior to the day of the primary, election, or runoff.
- The election superintendent shall be authorized to open the outer oath envelope of absentee ballots that have been verified and accepted, remove the contents of such outer envelope, or to open the inner envelope marked 'Official Absentee Ballot,' and scan the absentee ballot using one or more ballot scanners.
- At least three persons who are registrars, deputy registrars, poll workers, or absentee ballot clerks must be present before commencing.
- Three persons who are registrars, deputy registrars, or absentee ballot clerks shall be present at all times while the outer absentee ballot envelopes are being opened and the absentee ballots are being scanned.



# Early Processing/Scanning

- No person shall tally, tabulate, estimate, or attempt to tally, tabulate, or estimate or cause the ballot scanner or any other equipment to produce any tally or tabulate, partial or otherwise, of the absentee ballots cast until the time for the closing of the polls on the day of the primary, election, or runoff except as provided in this Code section.
- Prior to beginning the process set forth in this paragraph, the superintendent shall provide written notice to the Secretary of State in writing at least seven days prior to processing and scanning absentee ballots. Such notice shall contain the dates, start and end times, and location or locations where absentee ballots will be processed and scanned.
- The superintendent shall also post such notice publicly in a prominent location in the superintendent's office and on the home page of the county election superintendent's website, if the county election superintendent maintains such a website.



# Brief Overview of Senate Bill 202

## Restrictions on Campaign Activities

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

- Restriction on giving, offering to give, or participating in the giving of any money or gifts, including food or drink, to electors to solicit votes.
- Poll Officer is not prohibited from making available self-service water from an unattended receptacle to an elector waiting in line to vote.



# Brief Overview of Senate Bill 202

## **Provisional Ballots**

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

- If the person presents himself or herself at a polling place in the county in which he or she is registered to vote, but not at the precinct at which he or she is registered to vote, the poll officials shall inform the person of the polling location for the precinct where such person is registered to vote.
- The poll officials shall also inform such person that any votes cast by a provisional ballot in the wrong precinct will not be counted unless it is cast after 5:00 P.M. and before the regular time for the closing of the polls on the day of the primary, election, or runoff.
- The person must execute a sworn statement stating that he or she is unable to vote at his or her correct polling place prior to the closing of the polls and giving the reason therefor.



## **Provisional Ballots**

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

- If person casting the provisional ballot timely registered to vote and was eligible and entitled to
  vote in the precinct in which he or she voted in such primary or election, the provisional ballot
  shall be counted and included in the county's or municipality's certified election results.
- If the person voting the provisional ballot timely registered and was eligible and entitled to vote
  in the primary or election but voted in the wrong precinct, only the person voted between the
  hours of 5:00 P.M. and the regular time for the closing of the polls on the day of the primary,
  election, or runoff and provided the required sworn statement will be reviewed.
  - The superintendent shall count such person's votes which were cast for candidates in those
    races for which the person was entitled to vote but shall not count the votes cast for candidates
    in those races in which such person was not entitled to vote.
- The original ballot shall be retained and the sworn statement must be transmitted to the Secretary
  of State with the certification documents and the statement will be reviewed by the State Election
  Board.

## **Provisional Ballot Affidavit (Out of Precinct)**

<u>Instructions</u>: This form is to be used when an elector has presented himself or herself at a polling place in the county/municipality in which he or she is registered to vote, but not at the precinct at which he or she is registered to vote. ## **Provisional Ballot Voting Guide**

#### WHAT IS A PROVISIONAL BALLOT?

A provisional ballot is a paper ballot used by a voter when their eligibility to vote cannot be determined at the polling place. Voters who declare they are registered and eligible to vote in the county in which they desire to vote, but whose names do not appear on the registration list, must be permitted to cast a provisional ballot. If you have a good faith belief you are properly registered in your county, you have the right to vote a provisional ballot. The provisional ballot will count if your eligibility can be determined within three days after Election Day by your County Registrar's office.

#### WHICH SCENARIO APPLIES TO YOU?

- I am a registered voter in this county, but I am told I am at the wrong polling place in my county.
  - You have the right to vote a provisional ballot in this polling place or you can go to your correct polling place, if practicable for you to do so. It is up to you to make this determination. You should take into account the distance of your assigned polling place, the severity of traffic, the possibility of a long line, and your work/personal schedule. Any votes cast by a provisional ballot in the wrong precinct will not be counted unless it is cast after 5:00 P.M. and before the regular time for the closing of the polls on the day of the primary, election, or runoff. If so, your vote will be counted for all the races for which you are eligible.
- I am a registered voter, but I am told I am registered in a different county. You can vote a provisional ballot in this polling place, if you believe that you timely registered to vote in this county. If you know you are not registered in this county, you cannot vote a provisional ballot in this county. If you vote a provisional ballot in this county and the County Registrar's office determines that you have timely registered to vote in this county, your vote will be counted. If you have proof of your registration, you may provide it to the Registrar's office within three days of the election.
- I believe I am registered to vote in this county, but the poll worker cannot find my registration or the Registrar's Office cannot confirm my registration. You can vote a provisional ballot in this polling place, if you believe that you timely registered to vote in this county. If you vote a provisional ballot in this county and the County Registrar's office determines that you have timely registered to vote in this county, your vote will be counted. If you have proof of your registration, you may provide it to the Registrar's office within three days of the election.

- I am a registered voter in this county, but I did not bring a photo ID to the polls. If you have time to find your valid photo ID and return to vote, you can vote normally. If not, you can vote a provisional ballot, but you must affirm that you are the voter identified on the voter roll. Your vote will only be counted if you provide the County Registrar's Office with a copy of a valid photo ID. For your vote to count, you must send a copy of your valid photo ID to your County Registrar's Office within three days of the election. Georgia law requires registered voters to show photo identification in order to vote in person. When you vote in person, you must provide one of the following photo IDs:
  - o A Georgia driver's license, even if expired

Registrar's Office within three days of the election.

- Any valid state or federal government issued photo ID, including one issued by the Department of Driver Services or your Voter Registrar
- Valid U.S. passport
- Valid employee photo ID from any branch, department, agency, or entity of the U.S.
   Government, this state, or any county, municipality, board, authority or other entity of this state
- Valid U.S. military photo ID
- Valid tribal photo ID
- I am a first time voter in Georgia and when I registered to vote by mail in this county I did not provide a copy of identification verifying my name and address.
  If you have time to find the required identification and return to vote, you can vote normally. If not, you can vote a provisional ballot. Your vote will only be counted if you provide the County Registrar's office a copy of a valid ID that shows your name and address in this county where you are registered to vote or a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows your name and address in this county where you are registered to vote. You must provide a copy of this information to the County
- I am voting during extended polling hours in an election in which federal candidates are on the ballot.

In the event that the polling hours for a polling place are extended by a court order beyond the normal closing time for a primary, election, or runoff in which federal candidates are on the ballot, all voters who vote after the normal closing time for the polling place shall vote by provisional ballot. (SEB Rule 183-1-12-.18)

If you have proof of your registration or need to provide a copy of your ID, you can send it to your County Registrar's Office in person, by email, by fax or, in the case of disabled voters, by third party delivery. You must do so within three days of the election for it to be considered.

# **SB202 LOCAL COSTS**

## SPECIAL SECURITY PAPER

- Legislative testimony estimated the increase to range from 50% to 300% increase in paper cost.
- Applies to all ballots BMD, emergency paper ballots, provisional and mail ballots.
- Precinct scanners can be set to detect security paper.
- Central scanners cannot detect security paper.

If the increase is \$.13 per sheet, that adds \$3.2M for projected 25M ballots over a 4-year election cycle.

# **SB202 LOCAL COSTS**

## **NEW EARLY VOTING REQUIREMENTS**

- A second mandatory Saturday for every election.
- New requirement for municipalities [and local county elections, like SPLOSTs] to have two Saturdays for early voting.
- Requirement for municipalities which run their own elections to start daily reporting to SOS via E-Net.
- · Costs may include additional staff, training, equipment.

The additional Saturday alone is likely to add \$1M for the 100 smallest counties over the next 4-year election cycle.

## Candidate Withdrawal

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

#### New Subsection to Code Section 21-2-134

- In the event of the death of a candidate on the ballot in a nonpartisan election prior to such nonpartisan election:
  - The candidate's name shall remain on the ballot and all votes cast for such candidate shall be counted.
- If the deceased candidate receives the required number of votes to be elected, such contest shall be handled as a failure to fill the office under Code Section 21-2-504. (Call for a Special Primary or Election)
- If the deceased candidate receives enough votes to be in a run-off election, such run-off election shall be conducted. However, the candidates in the runoff shall be determined in accordance with paragraph (2) of subsection (a) of Code Section 21-2-501. (Remaining two candidates with the highest numbers of votes)



## **Tabulation and Certification**

Senate Bill 202 - Effective Now

- The superintendent shall, after the close of the polls on the day of a
  primary or election publicly commence the computation and
  canvassing of the returns and continue until all absentee ballots
  received by the close of the polls and all ballots cast on the day of the
  primary or election have been counted and tabulated. The results of
  the tabulation must be released to the public from day to day until
  completed.
- SOS must create a pilot program for the posting of digital images of the scanned paper ballots created by the voting system.
  - Scanned ballot images created by a voting system shall be public records subject to disclosure under this article.
- Election returns must be certified no later than 5:00 P.M. on the **Monday** following the date on which the election.
